Saint Mary of Egypt

The Fifth Sunday recalls the memory of Saint Mary of Egypt, the repentant harlot. Mary tells us, first of all, that no amount of sin and wickedness can keep a person from God if he truly repents. Christ himself has come "to call sinners to repentance" and to save them from their sins (Lk 5:32).

In addition, Saint Mary tells us that it is never too late in life -- or in Lent -- to repent. Christ will gladly receive all who come to him even at the eleventh hour of their lives. But their coming must be in serious and sincere repentance.

The commemoration of the life of St. Mary of Egypt, who formerly had been a great sinner, is intended to serve as an example of true repentance for all and convince us of the ineffable compassion of God. The Church finds in her an image of true repentance and a source of encouragement for those engaged in spiritual endeavors, by virtue of the example of the ineffable mercy of God shown towards her a repentant sinner.

Troparion (St. Mary of Egypt)

The image of <u>God</u> was <u>truly</u> preserved in thee, O <u>Mother</u>, for thou didst take <u>up</u> the <u>Cross</u> and <u>follow</u> Christ.

By so <u>doing</u>, thou <u>taughtest</u> us to disregard the flesh for it <u>passes</u> away; but to care in<u>stead</u> for the <u>soul</u>, for it is im<u>mor</u>tal.//


Therefore thy <u>spirit</u>, O <u>holy</u> Mother Mary, rejoices with the <u>angels</u>.

Kontakion (St. Mary of Egypt)

Having <u>been</u> a sinful <u>wo</u>man, thou becamest through repentance a <u>bride</u> of Christ. Having attained an<u>gel</u>ic life, thou didst defeat demons with the <u>weap</u>on of the Cross.// Therefore, O most glorious Mary, thou art a <u>bride</u> of the <u>King</u>dom.

The Church refers to the upcoming week as the Week of Palms. During this week, Lazarus, the friend of our Lord, dies. The death of Lazarus and Jesus' call for him to return to life set in motion the final days of Our Lord on this earth that include His triumphal entry into Jerusalem, His betrayal, His passion, His death, and His Resurrection. The Church carries us through these events liturgically by way of her Divine services. Please participate and witness the glory of God through the services offered for the remainder of Great Lent, the entirety of Holy Week, and through to the Great and Holy Pascha!
